

Dr. Frank J. Hester was born in Detroit, Michigan, USA February 10, 1933. He is married with 5 children. He earned a BA in Biology from University of California Santa Barbara (1955), an MS in Zoology from University of Hawaii (1957) and a Ph.D. in Marine Biology from University of California, Scripps Institution of Oceanography (1967). He began his career in fisheries in 1960 in San Diego working on the tuna fishery in the eastern Pacific for the US Bureau of Commercial Fisheries. In 1970, he was appointed Laboratory Director for the Bureau's Honolulu laboratory and Area Director for Hawaii, American Samoa, Guam and the US Trust Territories of the Pacific and was responsible for research, development and management of pelagic fisheries in the central and western Pacific. Since 1974, he has been consulting on fisheries development and management, environmental issues, and aquaculture for industry, government and non-governmental fishery organizations including FAO and the Asian Development Bank. He became chief scientist for the East Cast Tuna Association in 1981 on Atlantic bluefin tuna, scientific advisor on whaling at the International Whaling Commission for St. Vincent and the Grenadines and Grenada since 1989, and consulting scientist to the Directed Shark Fishery Association since 1996 as a participant in SEW and SEDAR evaluation and assessments. Since 1995, Frank has been involved in the culture of finfish and mollusks at several sites in Baja California Sur, Mexico. Dr. Hester is author to more than 100 scientific and technical papers and reports.
