

What is scoping?



Council Process – FMP/Plan Amendment

FISHERY ISSUE:

Management Need Identified



SCOPING:

Public provides comments on ways to address management need

Council reviews input/ develops management actions and alternatives

PUBLIC HEARING:

Public provides comments on management actions and alternatives

Council reviews input/ modifies amendment and selects preferred alternatives

FINAL APPROVAL:

Last Chance for Public Input at Council Meeting

Why is the Council considering taking action?





- Data uncertainty for the recreational sector often leads to <u>notable challenges</u> in managing the fisheries for several Snapper Grouper species.
- Many Snapper Grouper species are also experiencing <u>high mortality</u> due to fish that are caught but do not survive being released.
- Some of the ways to address these issues includes the creation of a <u>private recreational permit</u> and <u>improving education</u> on best fishing practices.

What is the intended outcome?






Vision Statement: A permit for the private recreational sector of the South Atlantic Snapper Grouper fishery will facilitate the collection, validation, and analysis of harvest and discard data to improve the catch and effort estimates used for fisheries science and management decisionmaking.

What are the Council's ideas right now for implementing a private recreational permit?



- The Council is considering <u>establishing a private</u> recreational permit to fish for, harvest, or possess Snapper Grouper species in the South Atlantic Region.
- Permit issued to a <u>vessel</u> or to an <u>individual angler</u>?
- If issued to a <u>vessel</u> then all anglers fishing onboard that vessel would be covered.
- If issued to an <u>individual angler</u>, then would need to decide who should get the permit?
 - All Snapper Grouper anglers?
 - All Snapper Grouper anglers fishing from a private vessel?
 - At least one angler onboard a private vessel would need a permit?



What species would be covered by a private recreational permit?



- Currently the Council is considering the following groups of species:
 - All 55 species within the Snapper Grouper complex.
 - The 15 species within the Snapper Grouper complex that have a peer-reviewed <u>stock</u> <u>assessment</u> in the South Atlantic.
 - The 13 species that are covered by the <u>Florida</u>
 <u>State Reef Fish Angler Designation</u>.



What are the Council's ideas right now for establishing an education component?





- An <u>education component</u> would provide an opportunity to educate anglers on several measures:
 - Best fishing practices,
 - Species that make up the Snapper Grouper complex,
 - · Species identification, and
 - Helpful tools for remembering fishing regulations.
- This component could be implemented:
 - · Immediately when the permit is developed, or
 - Possibly at a later date.
- The Council may also specify whether the education component would be:
 - Mandatory to obtain a permit, or Would be voluntary.

Private Recreational Permit

- 1) Type of Permit: Should the permit be <u>vessel-based</u> or <u>angler-based</u>?
 - If Angler-Based: Who should need to get the permit?
 - All anglers regardless of the platform from which they are fishing?
 - All anglers fishing from a <u>private vessel only</u>?
 - At least one angler onboard a private vessel would need to obtain a permit?
- 2) Species Covered: What species should be covered by the permit?
 - <u>All Snapper Grouper species?</u>
 - Only the species with a peer-reviewed <u>stock assessment</u>?
 - Only the species that fall within <u>Florida's State Reef Fish Angler</u> <u>designation</u>.
 - Other?

Education Component

- 1) Timing of implementation: Should it be established <u>immediately</u> with implementation of a permit or <u>delayed</u> until a future date?
- **2) Mandatory or Voluntary**: If implemented, should it be <u>mandatory</u> or <u>voluntary</u> in regard to allowing private recreational anglers to participate in the Snapper Grouper fishery?



Amendment Timing





- This amendment will continue to be developed throughout 2023 and into 2024.
- Measures that are chosen for implementation would likely become effective sometime in 2025 or thereafter.
- The public will have opportunity to comment again during public hearings in fall 2023 and at any Council meeting.


