RECREATIONAL REPORTING

- Accurate and timely data \rightarrow crucial to any recreational approach
- Angler involvement interest in providing data and collaborating on data collection
- SAFMC considering required or voluntary recreational reporting in Snapper
 Grouper Amendment 46

RECREATIONAL REPORTING

MyFishCount (SAFMC)

- Voluntary recreational reporting for red snapper launched in 2017
- Website or app
- # caught, # discarded, method of discard, weight, length, depth, area
- Program expanded in 2018 for all recreational species

BAROTRAUMA REDUCTION

- Discards and release mortality- negative effects on stock and rec fishing opportunities
- Venting and descending devices can help reduce release mortality

Snapper Grouper Regulatory Amendment
 29 includes requirement for venting
 devices, circle hooks and rig limit

Exempted Fishing Permits (EFPs)

NMFS can issue EFP for fisheries-related research, including pilot management programs

- EFP exempts the program from specified regulatory requirements
- An EFP could be used for a pilot approach to be tested and evaluated

Exempted Fishing Permits (EFPs)

- Gulf Council red snapper state management: EFP for each state, issued by NMFS
- Recreational participants are exempt from the federal accountability measures for Gulf red snapper
- Each state has an allocation of the Gulf red snapper recreational annual catch limit
- Each state provided a plan including seasons, bag/size limits, monitoring and closures when the state's allocation is met
- EFP allows the states to demonstrate their capability in managing red snapper harvest
- EFPs valid through Dec 31, 2019; Gulf Council working on amendments to establish an ongoing state management program
