CMP Framework Amendment 4 Public Hearing Summary (Comments received through August 19, 2016)

This summary includes comments received during public hearings along with written comments received as of August 19, 2016. **Attachment 7b** includes transcribed minutes from the in-person public hearings and the webinar hearing (36 people gave public comment). **Attachment 7c** includes written correspondence from a recreational fishing association and from the Virginia Marine Resources Commission. **Attachment 7d** includes that question log from the webinar component of the Q&A meeting. Overall:

- The early 2016 closure had negative economic and social impacts on recreational fishermen, including for-hire fishing businesses and specifically for fishermen in North Carolina and Virginia.

- The 2016 closure was unfair to fishermen in North Carolina and Virginia.

- There is a lot of concern about the data used to determine the ACL; data used in SEDAR 28 to determine the boundary between the Gulf and Atlantic stocks; and the MRIP data.

- Most commenters supported a 1 fish per person bag limit and a minimum size limit of 37" FL or 36" FL.

- There was not much support for a vessel limit, although some commenters supported a vessel limit of 2 or 3 fish.

- Some commenters supported modifying the accountability measures to remove the use of the 3-year average.

- Many commenters recommended that there never be a closure for recreational harvest, or at least that the season always be open May through September/October.

- Recreational data collection should be improved.

- There should be more representation from Virginia on the South Atlantic Fishery Management Council.
