


What is Outreach?






Why is Outreach important?

Red Snapper

The Council voted to increase the red snapper Annual Catch Limit from 7,185, 000 pounds to 8,080,000 pounds in 2012. If the 2012 Annual Catch Limit is not exceeded it will increase again to 8,690,000 pounds in 2013.

The Council tabled discussions on a regulatory amendment that considered making adjustments to the red snapper season structure by exploring weekend or weekday only fishing options.

Seems like more questionable "science" that you only do stock from natural structure, but doesn't matter where catch comes from.

Gulf of Mexico Fishery Management Council Chuck, I've run across a number of folks who share that false perception. Long line surveys are not conducted near artificial structure (for logistical purposes) but, that is only one sample method. Hook and line sampling, video monitoring, and direct observation (divers) are used to monitor fish at artificial reefs.

Gulf of Mexico Fishery Management Council The Council has said that they would like at least one 'trophy' species to be open all year long. When the rule went into place last year many fishermen expressed a desire to have the season extend later into the year. Closing June–July helps to push back the closure that would typically occur in fall when the quota is reached.
