

# Example Catch Card Program for Fish and Crab Species in the Northwest

Washington State Department of Fish and Wildlife Catch Record Card Program

# Background

- The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife uses catch cards for all kept sturgeon, steelhead, salmon, and halibut.
- There is a separate catch card for Puget Sound Dungeness crab.
- ❖ The program has been ongoing for 50+ years.
- Catch cards are required to be in the owner's possession when fishing for any of the above species.
- Catch cards are required to be sent back by a date specified by the agency, which is also printed on the card.
- For Dungeness crab there is an option to fill out the catch card data via the internet.

## **Data Collected**

The fish catch card is divided into four sections, one for each species.

#### On the card the angler must record:

- Species caught (species codes are provided for salmon and sturgeon)
- Where the fish was caught using a location code.
- When the fish was caught.
- Length of fish (for sturgeon only)



#### **Data Collected**

- For salmon, whether or not the adipose fin has been clipped, which indicates a hatchery fish.
- For halibut, whether the fish was harvested from a private vessel or from a charter boat.
- Cards must be sent back even if no fish are harvested.

## How are the Data Used?

- ❖ Data are used to estimate harvest using a correction factor for the number of cards not turned in.
- ❖ The catch cards generally provide the <u>official</u> harvest estimates for the four fish species in the program; however, creel surveys are also done and may be used as the official estimates.
- Catch card data are used to identify trends on a watershed basis.
- For Dungeness crab, the catch cards are the <u>primary</u> source of harvest information.
- The data are also used to track the health of fish stocks.

## **Cost of Catch Cards**

- The first catch card is free and is sent with the license when purchased.
- ❖ The license costs anywhere between \$11.35 and \$84.50 depending on residency, military status, length of time the license is valid, type if fishing (salt or freshwater), and age (child vs. adult).
- ❖ Purchase of any additional catch cards is \$12.10.
- A lost card can only be replaced by purchasing a new one.
- ❖ If one card is filled up another card must be purchased to continue fishing.

# Compliance

#### Compliance rates for returning fish catch cards are:

- ❖ 20% with no reminder post card sent.
- ❖ 45%-50% with reminder post card sent.
- There is no penalty for not turning in a fish catch card.

#### Compliance rates for returning **Dungeness crab** catch cards are:

- **\$** 55%-60%.
- There is a \$10.00 penalty for not returning a Dungeness crab catch card.

# Processing of Cards and Data

- The WA Dept. of Fish and Wildlife processes approximately 250,000 catch cards each year.
- ❖ 2-3 staff members process the incoming cards.
- 4-5 staff enter the data.
- ❖ 3-4 months to process the data.
