


ABOUT THE COUNCIL

- 1 of 8 regional fishery management Councils
- Jurisdiction:
 - Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ) ranges from 3-200 miles
 - South Atlantic Region: NC, SC, GA, East Coast of FL
- Council Makeup:
 - Include recreational and commercial fishermen, state marine agency reps, and federal partners
 - 17 members, 13 voting, 4 non-voting
 - Representatives from each state in the region.
- The Council provides recommendations to the NMFS.




Background

The NMFS Coastal Fisheries Logbook Program collects data from commercial vessels in the Atlantic and the Gulf of Mexico.

In the South Atlantic, commercial fishermen holding Snapper Grouper, Dolphin Wahoo, or Coastal Migratory Pelagic permits are required to fill out a paper logbook within 7 days of completing a trip and mail it to the Southeast Fisheries Science Center.





Background

A subset (20%) of commercial coastal logbook participants is selected to also fill out a supplemental **economic or discard survey** for a year

- Mailed out separately from coastal logbook
- Mandatory to complete *if selected*

What is being proposed?



do away with the current paper-based reporting for commercial logbooks and require

ELECTRONIC REPORTING

for commercial vessels currently reporting through the NMFS coastal fisheries logbook program

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Who is proposing this action?



This action may affect vessels fishing in the Greater Atlantic Region and in other fisheries (e.g., Highly Migratory Species) that also have Southeast permits

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Why are the Councils considering action?

To improve:

- 1. timeliness and efficiency of commercial logbook data collection and management
- 2. monitoring
- 3. compliance

To eventually achieve one-stopreporting for vessels holding multiple permits




Who will be affected?

This amendment would modify the FMPs for:


- South Atlantic Snapper Grouper,
- Atlantic Dolphin Wahoo,
- Atlantic and Gulf of Mexico Coastal Migratory Pelagics,
- Gulf Reef Fish





All federally permitted commercial vessels in the above fisheries participating in the Coastal Fisheries Logbook program





What reporting platform will be required?

- Currently, e-Trips is a NMFS-approved application for electronic reporting in other fisheries and programs.
- The Atlantic Coastal Cooperative Statistics Program (ACCSP) is developing and testing e-Trips in collaboration with NMFS for use in the Southeast.
- Other platforms may become available from different vendors.



What will change?


Data fields may need to be added, removed, or modified. However, modifications are expected to be minor.



What will change?

The supplemental portions of the logbook (economic and discard surveys) will be **voluntary for vessels not selected to submit**

Discards will be reported when completing the commercial logbook (**disposition of catch**)



What will not change?

- Timing for reporting will remain 7 days after the conclusion of each commercial fishing trip
- 20% of vessels will continue to be selected to submit supplemental surveys.



Summary of Biological Effects

This action is administrative in nature and therefore **not expected to have any direct effects on the biological environment**.

There may be long-term indirect positive effects from:

- Timeliness of data on catch and discards
- Fewer errors, ease of submission may reduce recall bias
- Improved compliance





Summary of Economic Effects

- Commercial fishermen will need an internet equipped device such as a laptop, tablet, or smartphone – cost to those who do not have device but most likely have access already.
- Time savings for fishermen to submit?
- Time and cost savings to increased assurance that the logbook entry was submitted.





Summary of Social effects

- Direct short-term effects from individuals adjusting to the new process - mostly neutral or positive as most users are comfortable.
- Short-term negative effects for fishermen unaccustomed or uncomfortable with use of electronic reporting.
- Long-term effects expected to be positive as e-submission will simplify data collection and improve data quality.



When will ereporting go into effect?

Amendment is expected to be approved in Fall 2023.

NMFS will develop vendor specifications for electronic platforms and new platforms will need to be approved.

Regulations may be effective in early 2025.

FAQs



- Can I still report on the paper logbook if I choose? There may be a transition time during which the paper logbook will be phased out.
- How will I know if I have been selected to fill out the supplemental surveys?

Commercial fishermen are currently notified by a mailed letter instructing them they have been selected to complete the survey. This will remain the same under the electronic system.

FAQs



• Will the economic section always appear on the logbook form?

Yes, it will always appear in the logbook form but will only be mandatory for selected vessels.

• Where do the reported data go?

Data will be transmitted via secure servers to NMFS, the NMFS will review data for quality and use the data for monitoring and compliance.

FAQs



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• What is the expected timeline of one-stop reporting for vessels with multiple permits?

NMFS is currently working on a One-Stop-Reporting application and program. Estimated timeline for the work will be a few years based on different collection requirements and needs.

• Who should fishermen call if they are having trouble with the submission process?
