FINAL SUMMARY REPORT SNAPPER GROUPER COMMITTEE SOUTH ATLANTIC FISHERY MANAGEMENT COUNCIL June 13-15, 2023

The Committee approved the minutes from the March 2023 meeting and the agenda for the June 2023 meeting. Staff presented a table summarizing progress of Council-approved amendments, which will be included in the Agenda Overview for future Council meetings. The Committee found the table useful and recommended future inclusion of this table on the Council website.

Wreckfish (SG Amendment 48)

A review of the Wreckfish ITQ Program was completed in 2019 and included recommendations for improvement, including stakeholder concerns with offloading site and time requirements. At their March 2023 meeting the Council requested staff bring back options for maintaining monitoring without the offloading site and time requirements, including a possible hail-in/hail-out requirement. NMFS provided a presentation on monitoring options for the fishery and staff presented a decision document for the Committee to discuss. The Snapper Grouper Advisory Panel (AP) Chair provided a summary of comments and motions on the wreckfish fishery.

Modernizing the wreckfish ITQ program continues to be a complex process. To help facilitate continued development of SG Amendment 48, the Committee proposed establishing a Wreckfish Sub-Committee and an Ad-Hoc Wreckfish Advisory Group.

MOTION 1: CREATE AN AD HOC WRECKFISH ADVISORY GROUP CONSISTING OF THE CURRENT SHAREHOLDERS FOR THE PURPOSE OF DISCUSSING SNAPPER GROUPER AMENDMENT 48. A WRECKFISH ADVISORY PANEL WILL BE CREATED AS DIRECTED BY THE COUNCIL IN JUNE 2023 THROUGH THE EXISTING AP PROCESS. APPOINTMENTS FOR THIS AP WILL BE MADE IN DECEMBER 2023. APPROVED BY COMMITTEE

MOTION 2: ESTABLISH AN AD HOC COUNCIL WRECKFISH SUB-COMMITTEE TO CONTINUE DEVELOPMENT OF AMENDMENT 48. THE WRECKFISH SUB-COMMITTEE WILL REPORT TO THE SNAPPER GROUPER COMMITTEE DURING REGULARLY SCHEDULED MEETINGS.

Direction to Staff: Convene a meeting of the WAG and the Wreckfish Sub-Committee prior to September 2023.

SAFE Report

Stock Assessment and Fishery Evaluation (SAFE) Reports are required through National Standard 2 of the Magnuson-Stevens Act. These reports can serve as regular updates to the SSC and Council to aid in discussing the condition of the stock and potential need for adjusting current management measures. Staff presented information included in the <u>SAFE Report</u> and highlighted some findings.

Yellowtail Snapper (SG Amendment 44/RF Amendment 55)

Snapper Grouper Amendment 44/ Reef Fish Amendment 55 considers modifying the jurisdictional allocation between the Gulf of Mexico and South Atlantic regions, modifying the South Atlantic annual catch limit and annual optimum yield, and the Gulf of Mexico annual catch limit in response to the most recent stock assessment (2022 SEDAR 64 Interim Analysis) The Committee reviewed AP and SSC feedback and a decision document. The Committee discussed the following:

Action 1. Modify the yellowtail snapper stock overfishing limit and stock acceptable biological catch and jurisdictional allocation of the stock acceptable biological catch between the South Atlantic and Gulf of Mexico Fishery Management Councils' Jurisdictions

- The current jurisdictional allocations (75%/25%) were calculated with landings that included a coding issue with Tortugas landings. However, this issue does not affect the assessment results or landings used in SG Amendment 44 calculations.
- **Direction to Staff:** The committee directed the IPT to recalculate the jurisdictional allocation with revised landings and adjust the suite of alternatives to include the corrected allocation percentages as well as the 80% and 20% split as suggested by the SG AP.
- Staff noted that the jurisdictional allocation percentages for **Alternative 3** needed to be recalculated, using the most recent landings data set for each region. This results in percentage values that are the same as **Alternative 4**. Staff provided an 80% South Atlantic and 20% Gulf of Mexico alternative to consider with the rationale that this option is not likely to result in the ACLs being met for either region. An updated decision document with these values was provided.

Scamp/Yellowmouth Grouper (SG Amendment 55)

Snapper Grouper Amendment 55 considers, in response to SEDAR 68, establishing a new scamp and yellowmouth grouper complex, modifying the Other Shallow Water Grouper Complex, and establishing the following for the new scamp and yellow mouth complex: stock determination criteria, a rebuilding schedule, catch limit, and accountability measures. The Council reviewed SSC and AP feedback and a decision document.

Action 2. Define equilibrium optimum yield, maximum sustainable yield, minimum stock size threshold, and maximum fishing mortality threshold for the South Atlantic Scamp and Yellowmouth Complex

Direction to Staff: add alternatives for Action 2a for the equilibrium OY.

Action 3. Establish a rebuilding plan for the South Atlantic Scamp and Yellowmouth Grouper Complex

Next Steps: The SSC will review the additional OFL projections at F_{40%SPR} during their July SSC meeting and provide additional guidance to the Council at their September meeting.

- SEFSC not confident they will be able to provide tmax that is scientifically defensible. They will need more time to figure out what can be provided.
- Need to revisit the tmin calculation.

Action 4. Establish the acceptable biological catch, total annual catch limit, and annual optimum yield for the South Atlantic Scamp and Yellowmouth Grouper Complex and revise the total annual catch limit, annual optimum yield, and sector annual catch limits for the Other South Atlantic Shallow Water Grouper Complex

Sub-Action 4b. Revise the total annual catch limit, annual optimum yield, and sector annual catch limits for the Other South Atlantic Shallow Water Grouper Complex

Direction to Staff:

- Examine the remaining Other Shallow Water Grouper species (red hind, rock hind, coney, graysby, yellowfin) and consider the process of designating them as ecosystem component species within Amendment 55.
- If the species in the OSWG complex are not designated as ecosystem component species, then the ABC/ACL/OY, allocations, and sector ACLs will be updated to include FES recreational estimates within Amendment. 55

Action 5. Establish the South Atlantic Scamp and Yellowmouth Grouper Complex sector allocations and sector annual catch limits

Direction to Staff:

- Add an option that allocates the reduction in catch levels proportional to each sector's recent landings, similar to the method used in Amendment 53.
- Add optionS that base allocations based on the recent years of landings.
 - o GO BACK TO 2013 ONWARD AND 2018 ONWARD

Action 6. Establish commercial accountability measures for the Scamp and Yellowmouth **Grouper Complex**

Direction to Staff: Add options to mirror the suite of options for the recreational accountability measures.

MOTION 3: APPROVE AMENDMENT 55 FOR SCOPING APPROVED BY COMMITTEE APPROVED BY COUNCIL

Direction to Staff: Conduct scoping hearings via webinar.

Black Sea Bass Stock Assessment (SEDAR 76)

SEFSC Staff presented the results of SEDAR 76, which indicated that South Atlantic black sea bass are overfished and experiencing overfishing. The SSC Chair presented the SSC's comments on the assessment. However, additional projections were requested by the SSC to develop recommended overfishing limit and acceptable biological catch levels. SEFSC is developing these additional projections and will present them for SSC Review in July 2023. Council Staff presented the <u>Fishery Overview</u> for black sea bass. The Committee made the following motion and provided the following guidance:

MOTION 4: INITIATE AN AMENDMENT PROCESS FOR THE BLACK SEA BASS FISHERY TO RESPOND TO THE SEDAR 76 STOCK ASSESSMENT. **APPROVED BY COMMITTEE**

- APPROVED BY COUNCIL
 - Additional changes to black sea bass management could include consideration of:
 - o Changes to allocation.
 - o Reducing the recreational bag limit.
 - o Designating on-demand gear as an allowable gear in the FMP.
 - There is some desire to change catch levels for 2024; additional discussion is necessary to determine whether and how this could be accomplished.

AP Recommendations (for topics not covered under agenda items)

The Snapper Grouper AP met on April 25-27, 2023, and discussed additional topics pertaining to the snapper grouper fishery. The AP Chair presented the Snapper Grouper AP's comments on other topics, including effects of Space Center operations on Florida fishing activities and commercial permitting.

Private Recreational Permitting Amendment (SG Amendment 46)

Amendment 46 considers establishing a private recreational permit and education component for the South Atlantic snapper grouper fishery. The amendment was reviewed by the Snapper Grouper Advisory Panel (AP) in April 2023 and the Snapper Grouper Recreational Permitting and Reporting Technical (AP) in May 2023. The respective AP Chairs provided summary AP feedback and then Council staff reviewed a decision document for Amendment 46. The Committee provided the following direction to staff and made the following motions:

Direction to Staff:

Action 1. Establish a private recreational snapper grouper permit to fish for, harvest, or possess snapper grouper species in the South Atlantic region

- Remove Alternative 4 from further consideration in Action 1.
- Remove Alternative 5 from further consideration in Action 1.
- Replace "any" with "all" in the alternatives.

Alternative 4. At least one angler on board a vessel participating in the private angler component of the snapper grouper fishery.

Alternative 5. <u>Any private angler participating in the snapper grouper fishery, regardless of where fishing occurs.</u>

Action 2. Specify the Council-managed species that would be covered by a private recreational snapper grouper permit

- Remove Alternative 6 from further consideration in Action 2.
- Add yellowmouth grouper and scamp to the list of assessed species.
- Add an alternative that would apply to all snapper grouper species with a size or bag limit.
- Examine the top species that are harvested.
- Examine species with low PSEs.

Alternative 6. Any species in the shallow water grouper complex.

Action 3. Specify the area where a private recreational snapper grouper permit would be required to fish for, harvest, or possess snapper grouper species in the South Atlantic Region

• Remove Action 3 and incorporate discussion into Action 1.

Action 4. Specify how long a private recreational snapper grouper permit to fish for, harvest, or possess snapper grouper species in the South Atlantic region would remain valid

- Add alternatives where a permit would remain valid from:
 - o One year of issuance.
 - o From date of birth for permit holder.
- Remove Alternative 3 from further consideration in Action 4.

Alternative 3. Two calendar years.

Action 5. Establish mechanism that would allow a state to opt out of a federal private recreational snapper grouper permit to fish for, harvest, or possess snapper grouper species in the South Atlantic region

- Make sure that alternatives maintain that states may issue their own permit or license if it meets the requirements of proposed national marine fisheries service specifications.
- Request that the IPT provide additional information.

Action 7. Specify whether an education component in the private recreational portion of the snapper grouper fishery in the South Atlantic region would be mandatory or voluntary

• Replace "angler" with "permit holder".

Action 9. Specify the timing of education component requirements for the private recreational portion of the snapper grouper fishery in the South Atlantic region

- Add an alternative for each issuance of a permit.
- Add an alternative for every other year from issuance of a permit.
- Remove Alternative 3 from further consideration of Action 9.

Alternative 3. Every other calendar year.

MOTION 5: APPROVE THE PURPOSE AND NEED STATEMENTS, AS MODIFIED, FOR INCLUSION IN AMENDMENT 46.

The *purpose* is to develop a recreational permitting system that would WILL better identify the universe of private anglers or vessels targeting South Atlantic snapper grouper species and would WILL enhance the ability to collect recreational effort and catch data. Also work to promote best recreational fishing practices through education.

The *need* for the amendment is to improve education on best fishing practices and the quality of effort and catch data for the private component of the recreational sector that targets South Atlantic snapper grouper species, while minimizing, to the extent practicable, adverse social and economic effects. ALSO IMPROVE EDUCATION ON BEST FISHING PRACTICES.

Updates

Staff gave updates on the 2027 sunset of South Atlantic Special Management Zones established through Snapper Grouper Amendment 36 and Best Fishing Practices outreach.

Other Business

 The Committee reiterated and clarified its previous direction to include consideration of changing the 2-for-1 requirement for commercial permits IN THE AMENDMENT THAT WOULD FOLLOW COMPLETION OF THE SG MSE.

MOTION 7: EVALUATE CHANGING THE WAY THE COUNCIL APPLIES ALLOCATION PERCENTAGES TO THE ABC IN CALCULATING SECTOR ACLS.

- ALLOCATE TOTAL REMOVALS AND SUBTRACT SECTOR-SPECIFIC DEAD DISCARDS TO PROVIDE SECTOR ACLS

- Changing how allocation is applied would require consideration of changing allocation percentages based on removals rather than landings.
- In this evaluation, use landings and discard estimates that are considered best scientific information available.
- Consult the Southeast Fisheries Science Center for papers and available information describing pros and cons of this allocation and management method.
- For evaluating the alternative allocation method, obtain feedback from SSC, explore how other councils do it, consult with AP.

Timing and Tasks:

MOTION 8: DIRECT STAFF TO DO THE FOLLOWING:

- Begin development of an amendment responding to SEDAR 76 (black sea bass).
- Create an Ad-Hoc Wreckfish Advisory Group comprised of current wreckfish ITQ shareholders and create an Ad-Hoc Wreckfish Committee to discuss SG Amendment 48. Convene a meeting of both groups prior to the September 2023 Council meeting.
- Conduct scoping hearings for Amendment 55 (Scamp/Yellowmouth).
- Continue developing Amendment 46 (Private Recreational Permitting) for review at the September 2023 meeting.
- Convene the next meeting of the Snapper Grouper Recreational Permitting and Reporting Technical Advisory Panel.
- Prepare a SG Amendment 44/RF Amendment 55 (Yellowtail Snapper) document in preparation for the Council to select preferred alternatives and approve for public hearings in September 2023.
- Ask staff to send letter to USCG to obtain cumulative information on the launch security zones related to space activities

FINAL SUMMARY REPORT SNAPPER GROUPER COMMITTEE SOUTH ATLANTIC FISHERY MANAGEMENT COUNCIL September 12-14, 2023

The Committee approved the minutes from the June 2023 meeting and the agenda (after revisions) for the September 2023 meeting.

Wreckfish (SG Amendment 48)

A review of the Wreckfish ITQ Program was completed in 2019 and included recommendations for improvement. Modernizing the wreckfish ITQ program continues to be a complex process. To help facilitate continued development of SG Amendment 48, the Council established an Ad-Hoc Wreckfish Advisory Group (WAG) and a Wreckfish Sub-Committee (WSC). The Committee received an update on discussion topics for the WAG and WSC meetings to occur on September 19th and 20th, respectively, and an update on the amendment development timeline.

Additionally, NMFS staff provided a presentation on cost recovery, addressing questions posed by the Council during their March 2023 meeting. Ultimately, the Committee deferred additional cost recovery discussion until the WAG meets and provides additional input on the available options.

Private Recreational Permitting (SG Amendment 46)

Amendment 46 considers establishing a private recreational permit and education component for the South Atlantic snapper grouper fishery. In recent meetings, the Council has received input and technical guidance from the Private Recreational Reporting Working Group, Joint Council Workgroup on Section 102 of the Modernizing Recreational Fisheries Management Act, and the Snapper Grouper Recreational Permitting and Reporting Technical Advisory Panel (RPRT AP). After reviewing this input, the Council began work on the amendment and approved it for scoping at the December 2022 meeting. Of note at this meeting was also the removal of a reporting component from further consideration in the amendment.

The Council has since further developed Amendment 46, with the amendment being reviewed by the RPRT AP in August 2023. Dr. Luiz Barbieri, AP Chair, provided a summary of the AP feedback and then the Committee reviewed a decision document for Amendment 46. The Committee passed the following motions and provided the following direction to staff:

MOTION 1: ACCEPT THE EDITS TO THE PURPOSE AND NEED STATEMENTS.

The *purpose* of the amendment is to develop a recreational permitting system that will better identify the universe of private anglers or vessels targeting South Atlantic snapper grouper species and will enhance the ability to collect recreational effort and catch data. Also work to promote best recreational fishing practices through education.

The *need* for the amendment is to improve the quality of effort and catch data for the private component of the recreational sector that targets South Atlantic snapper grouper species, while minimizing, to the extent practicable, adverse social and economic effects. Also improve education on best fishing practices.

MOTION 2: REMOVE ALTERNATIVES 3 AND 6 IN ACTION 2 TO THE CONSIDERED BUT REJECTED SECTION.

Action 2. Specify the species that would be covered by a private recreational snapper grouper permit

Alternative 3. A federal private recreational snapper grouper permit would be required when fishing for, harvesting, or possessing <u>any assessed species</u> in the snapper grouper fishery management unit for which recreational harvest is allowed.

Alternative 6. A federal private recreational snapper grouper permit would be required when fishing for, harvesting, or possessing any species with <u>a size or bag limit</u>.

MOTION 3: REMOVE ACTION 3 TO THE CONSIDERED BUT REJECTED SECTION.

Action 3. Specify the effective term of a private recreational snapper grouper permit Alternative 1 (No Action). A federal permit is not required for a private angler or private vessel when fishing for, harvesting, or possessing snapper grouper species in the South Atlantic exclusive economic zone.

Alternative 2. A federal private recreational snapper grouper permit would remain valid for the calendar year that it was issued.

Alternative 3. A federal private recreational snapper grouper permit would remain valid for <u>one</u> <u>year from issuance</u>.

Alternative 4. A federal private recreational snapper grouper permit would expire on the date of birth for the permit holder.

MOTION 4: REMOVE ACTION 6 TO THE CONSIDERED BUT REJECTED SECTION AND CLARIFY IN ACTION 5 THAT THE INTENT IS FOR THE EDUCATION COMPONENT TO BE MANDATORY.

Action 6. Specify whether an education component in the private recreational portion of the snapper grouper fishery would be mandatory or voluntary

Alternative 1 (No Action). There is not a required education component for private recreational anglers to fish for, harvest, or possess snapper grouper species in the South Atlantic exclusive economic zone.

Alternative 2. An education component would be <u>mandatory</u> for all private recreational permit holders to fish for, harvest, or possess snapper grouper species in the South Atlantic exclusive economic zone.

Alternative 3. An education component would be <u>voluntary</u> for all private recreational permit holders to fish for, harvest, or possess snapper grouper species in the South Atlantic exclusive economic zone.

MOTION 5: REMOVE ALTERNATIVE 2 IN ACTION 8 TO THE CONSIDERED BUT REJECTED SECTION.

Action 8. Specify the timing of education component requirements for the private recreational portion of the snapper grouper fishery in the South Atlantic region Alternative 2. An education component would need to be completed each calendar year.

Direction to Staff:

Permit-related actions

- In the amendment document, note what could be improved upon in the existing saltwater angler registry and how permit actions will help with those improvements.
- Although Action 3 is removed, clarify that the intent is for the permit to be issued on an annual basis in the discussion of Action 1.
- For Action 4, ask the IPT to develop a draft process for how NMFS would certify a state program to allow the opt out of a federal permit requirement.

Education component related actions

- Change "anglers" to "permit holders" in Action 5.
- Task the IPT to:
 - o Consolidate the remaining education component actions.
 - o In Alternative 2 of Action 7, revise the wording of "implement immediately" to reflect implementing the education requirement in conjunction with the rule for the permit.

- O Develop an alternative in Action 8 that would require permittees to update their education requirement whenever education materials or modules are also updated.
- Clarify the connection between the education component and the option for states to opt out of the education requirement: Would the state need to use the same education materials?
- Ask the Outreach and Communications AP to provide input on developing an education requirement.
 - o Inventory the applicable education materials or programs that already exist.
 - o What types of information should be included in the materials or program.

Scamp/Yellowmouth Grouper (SG Amendment 55)

The results of SEDAR 68 were reviewed by the Council in March 2023 and staff were directed to start a plan amendment to reorganize the Other Shallow Water Grouper Complex, establish the new Scamp and Yellowmouth Grouper Complex and then establish a rebuilding plan, catch levels, allocations, and AMs for this new complex. In June 2023 the Council approved the amendment for scoping. Scoping hearings were held July 31, August 1 and 2. Staff reviewed a decision document which included an overview of scoping. The Council gave the following direction to staff:

Direction to Staff: Add stock determination criteria language to the purpose and need.

The *purpose* of this fishery management plan amendment is to remove yellowmouth grouper from the Other South Atlantic Shallow Water Grouper Complex and establish a new South Atlantic Scamp and Yellowmouth Grouper Complex. For the new complex, adopt stock determination criteria, establish a rebuilding plan, specify catch levels, sector allocations, and accountability measures based on the results of the SEDAR 68 (2022) stock assessment.

The *need* for this fishery management plan amendment is to rebuild the South Atlantic Scamp and Yellowmouth Grouper Complex, and achieve optimum yield while minimizing, to the extent practicable, adverse social and economic effects.

Direction to Staff: Add an alternative to **Action 4** that would set the annual catch limit equal to 95% of the acceptable biological catch.

Action 4. Establish the acceptable biological catch, and total annual catch limit and annual optimum yield for the South Atlantic Scamp and Yellowmouth Grouper Complex

Alternative 1 (No Action). No ACL is established for the Scamp Yellowmouth Grouper Complex.

Alternative 2. ACL = ABC

Alternative 3. ACL = 90% of ABC

Direction to Staff: Regarding the Other South Atlantic Shallow Water Grouper Complex (OSASWG):

- Add an action (8b in the decision document) that modifies the OSASWG Complex for the remaining 5 species (rock hind, red hind, coney, graysby, yellowfin)
- Direct the IPT to explore additional options and whether the ACL needs to be modified, are yellowmouth landings significant enough for the ACL to modified?
- Have the IPT assess the effects of reducing the catch limit and the need for management measures to avoid closures as well as clarifying the retention of the current size limit and recreational bag limit for scamp and yellowmouth grouper.

Yellowtail Snapper (SG Amendment 44/RF Amendment 55)

The Council reviewed the results of the SEDAR 68 Interim Analysis and instructed staff to resume work on this joint plan amendment in September 2022. This amendment will modify catch levels for South Atlantic and Gulf of Mexico yellowtail snapper as well updating the jurisdictional allocation of the stock acceptable biological catch, total South Atlantic annual catch limit, Gulf of Mexico annual catch limit, and South Atlantic sector allocations. Staff reviewed a decision document, and the Council provided the following direction to staff.

Direction to Staff:

- Ask the South Atlantic SSC to consider withdrawing the yellowtail snapper stock ABC and prioritize a new assessment for the stock in light of the MRIP-FES pilot study and Florida State Reef Fish Survey
- Because this is a joint amendment, ask the Gulf Council to consider consulting the Gulf SSC to do take the same action.

Black Sea Bass Stock Assessment (SEDAR 76)

The Council previously received results of the SEDAR 76 assessment, which indicated the Black Sea Bass stock in the South Atlantic is overfished and experiencing overfishing. The SSC Chair presented results of the SSC's July 2023 discussion of revised assessment projections. The SSC has formed a working group to further investigate assessment reference points and projections to develop catch level recommendations. These recommendations are expected to be available for the March 2024 Council meeting.

Council staff reported on the South Atlantic Ropeless Gear Workshop held on August 22-23 in Georgia. Council staff also presented a decision document outlining potential management actions for black sea bass, as well as timing and process options to develop these actions. The Committee made the following motion and provided the following guidance:

MOTION 6: INCLUDE BLACK SEA BASS ON-DEMAND POT GEAR IN THE BLACK AND GAG GROUPER FRAMEWORK AMENDMENT.

Direction to Staff:

- Develop the Gag/Black Grouper/Black Sea Bass on-demand pots framework amendment for approval for scoping at the December 2023 Council meeting.
- The plan amendment addressing the management response to the SEDAR 76 assessment will next be discussed by the Council in March 2024. At the March 2024 meeting, the Council will receive catch level and rebuilding recommendations from the SSC and consider approval of the plan amendment for scoping.
- Consider interim actions responding to assessment results at or following the March 2024 Council meeting.

Updates

The Committee received updates from staff on the Systems Management Plan Work Group and Best Fishing Practices outreach, including details on "What It Means to Me," a proposed outreach initiative.

The Committee was in support of the 'What It Means to Me' project and provided the following input:

- Committee members noted the importance of positive messaging for the Council. Sharing the stories of those involved in South Atlantic fisheries may help change attitudes surrounding the management process.
- Suggestions for additional conversation topics included: perspectives of changes within the fishery, habitat, and explaining how preservation is different than conservation.
- To target the younger generation, Committee members recommended utilizing videofocused social media platforms such as YouTube and Tik Tok.
 - It was recommended that staff utilize caution when identifying platforms to share participant videos.
- The Committee suggested possible project participants, including spearfishermen, Council members, and other fisheries managers.
- It was recommended that staff consider ways to evaluate the effectiveness of the program.

Direction to Staff: Ask the Snapper Grouper Advisory Panel for 'What It Means to Me' conversation topic suggestions.

The Committee also received an update on the Best Fishing Practices Volunteer Program (BFP MVP). They supported the continued development of the program and commented on how port samplers are an important audience to target because the regularly interact with fishermen at the docks.

SEDAR 86 (Red Grouper) Modifications

The SSC held a webinar on September 7, 2023, to discuss potential modifications to the SEDAR 86 (Red Grouper) Operational Assessment, including the incorporation of spatial structure into the assessment model and whether the changes necessitate changing the type of assessment being conducted. The SSC Chair presented the SSC's recommendation for the Council to consider transitioning the red grouper assessment to a benchmark rather than an operational assessment. This transition will require new terms of reference and new participant appointments.

Approve Topics for Snapper Grouper Advisory Panel Meeting

In light of recent issues with the MRIP-FES, and the dependence of red snapper discard estimates on MRIP, the Council's intent is to reconsider whether to submit Reg 35 in

December 2023. If the decision is not to submit, then look at information that was compiled during development of Reg 35 and consider what additional information would be needed to consider a different "short-term" action (would need to conduct public meetings).
