Final Summary Report Snapper Grouper Committee

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The Snapper Grouper Committee met on March 4-5, 2014, in Savannah, GA.

Status of landings for quota-managed snapper grouper species

The Committee received an update on the status of landings (commercial and recreational) for snapper grouper species under ACLs. The current recreational landings presentation provided by the Southeast Region includes effort data. However, this information is difficult to parse out on timeframes less than one year. Therefore, the Committee requested that effort data be only provided on a yearly basis from now on.

Dr. Jack McGovern gave a presentation on a possible red snapper season for 2014. Dr. McGovern stated the following:

- 2013 data are currently being finalized.
- Data from a study conducted by the state of Florida will be available soon.
- The SEFSC report is expected in May, including the estimate of total removals that will determine whether there will be a season in 2014.

Status of Amendments Approved for Secretarial Review

The Committee received a status report from Dr. McGovern on the following amendments:

- Amendment 27/EA (Mgmt Authority/Fmwk/Crew Size/Blue Runner) the amendment was approved and regulations became effective on January 27, 2014.
- Regulatory Amendment 14/EA (Multiple Species) the Council submitted the amendment to NMFS on January 15, 2014. The Proposed Rule package is at NMFS Headquarters and a Proposed Rule is expected to publish soon.
- Emergency Rule (Blueline Tilefish) the Rule package is under review at the Regional Office and expected to go to NMFS HQ soon. Regulations could be effective in late March or early April. The Rule will be effective for 180 days and can be extended for an additional 186 days.

Oculina Experimental Closed Area Evaluation

Anna Martin, Council staff, briefed the Committee on planned activities to address the 10-year re-evaluation of the Oculina Experimental Closed Area (OECA). The Oculina Evaluation Team was originally going to convene via webinar on February 13, 2014 to initiate discussions on re-evaluation of the OECA. However, the webinar had to be re-scheduled due to weather-related problems. A series of breakout groups to discuss the research, outreach and law enforcement

portions of the Evaluation Plan will be held the week of March 10, 2014. The OECA Evaluation Team's final report will be presented to the Council at their June 2014 meeting.

Regulatory Amendment 16 (black sea bass pot closure)

Myra Brouwer, Council staff, presented an overview of scoping comments received on the amendment during the January 2014 round of hearings. The Committee provided guidance and made the following motions:

The need for the amendment is to minimize *potential negative* socio-economic impacts to black sea bass pot endorsement holders while maintaining protection for ESA-listed whales in the South Atlantic region.

NOAA GC Update on Amendment 22 (recreational harvest tag program)

NOAA GC is currently developing guidelines that can be applied nationally to determine whether proposed programs fit the criteria of a Limited Access Privilege Program (LAPP). More information is currently needed to determine whether the proposed recreational harvest tag program in Amendment 22 would be considered a LAPP. To that purpose, NOAA GC began by asking a series of questions from each of the state directors. However, it was decided that directors would be contacted directly and more details would be provided to the Committee and the Council at their June 2014 meeting.

Amendment 29 (ORCS & gray triggerfish)

Myra Brouwer, Council staff, provided a summary of public comments received on the amendment during the January 2014 round of hearings. The Committee made the following motions and issued the following guidance under each action:

MOTION: ACCEPT THE IPT'S RECOMMENDED CHANGES TO THE PURPOSE AND NEED:

The purpose of the actions is to: update the South Atlantic Council's South Atlantic Fishery Management Council's (South Atlantic Council) acceptable biological catch (ABC) control rule to incorporate methodology for determining the ABC of "Only Reliable Catch Species" (ORCS); adjust ABCs for the affected species; and establish management measures for gray triggerfish in federal waters of the South Atlantic region.

The need for action is to: specify ABCs for snapper grouper species based on the best available scientific information adopt the recommendations of the South Atlantic Council's Scientific and Statistical Committee (SSC) to update the ABC Control Rule and adjust ABCs for "ORCS" based on the revised ABC Control Rule, lengthen the commercial season for gray triggerfish to diminish and/or prevent derby conditions, and ensure that overfishing does not occur pending a new assessment of the gray triggerfish stock in the South Atlantic region.

Regulatory Amendment 21 (MSST)

The Committee provided guidance and made the following motions:

The purpose for the action is to modify the definition of MSST for select snapper grouper species with low natural mortality rates.

The need for the proposed action is to prevent snapper grouper stocks with low natural mortality rates from frequently alternating between overfished and rebuilt conditions due to natural variation in recruitment and other environmental factors.

Sub-alternative 2c. Change MSST if the estimation of M is 0.25 or lower based on the estimation of the natural morality rate (M) from a peer-review report (e.g., a SEDAR stock assessment).

Need for Action

The intent of Snapper Grouper Amendment 34, Golden Crab Amendment 9, and Dolphin Wahoo Amendment 8 is to base conservation and management measures upon the best scientific information available, and to prevent unnecessary negative socio-economic impacts that may otherwise be realized in these fisheries and fishing communities, and ensure overfishing does not occur in accordance with the provisions set forth in the Magnuson-Stevens Act.

Visioning Project

Amber Von Harten, Council staff, gave the Committee an update of the port meetings that have been held to date and input gathered at those meetings. Five port meetings were conducted in South Carolina with a total of 53 participants representing the commercial, recreational, for-hire, and federal dealer sectors. The main issues discussed at the meetings were: reporting, data collection & research, flexibility in management, reducing discards, regional/sub-regional management, and time/area management.

Data Needs for Economic Efficiency Analysis/Net Benefit Analysis

At their December 2013 meeting, the Council asked the following from the Southeast Fisheries Science Center: Do data exist to support an economic efficiency analysis of current allocations and net benefit analyses of proposed reallocations in the snapper-grouper, coastal migratory pelagics, and dolphin-wahoo fisheries?

Dr. Ponwith briefed the Committee on the SEFSC existing capabilities to address the Council's request. Dr. Ponwith indicated that commercial data are readily available in the form of exvessel prices and landings for all species. However, recreational data are only partially available. Dr. Ponwith posed several question to the Committee to better evaluate the type of analyses that could be conducted and provide an estimate of how long the analyses would take. The Committee expressed their desire to have the Socioeconomic Panel of the SSC evaluate the information provided by the SEFSC. The Committee reiterated that allocation issues would not be addressed for the snapper grouper fishery until after the Council has completed their visioning and strategic planning process.

Other Business

There were no items addressed by the Committee.

The Council discussed the following:

- Removal of the circle-hook requirement the Council stated their intent to review the information on its utility and take appropriate action in the future.
- Restructuring of some of the snapper grouper complexes the Council stated their intent to address this issue in the near future. The Council has acknowledged the need to reevaluate the various complexes within the Snapper Grouper Fishery Management Unit but indicated they had not yet taken action to address the issue pending the update to the ABC Control Rule and subsequent revisions to the ABCs for data-poor stocks (ORCS).
- Golden tilefish longline endorsements -- the Council discussed the current regulation that disallows individuals with a golden tilefish longline endorsement to fish for golden tilefish with bandit gear after the ACL for the longline sector has been met. The Council reiterated that was indeed their intent when the endorsement program was established in Amendment 18B. NOAA GC suggested that the Council Chair be given the authority to re-deem any clarifying revisions to the regulations.
- Retention of the recreational bag limit by commercial fishermen The Council expressed concern over allowing retention of the recreational bag limit when the commercial season is closed and intends to consider it in the future.

MOTION: GIVE THE COUNCIL CHAIR THE AUTHORITY TO RE-DEEM ANY CLARIFYING REVISIONS TO THE REGULATIONS FOR THE COMMERCIAL GOLDEN TILEFISH FISHERY.
