SNAPPER GROUPER

Regulatory Amendment 30 (Red Grouper)

MOTION #1: APPROVE THE IPT'S SUGGESTED EDITS UNDER ACTION 1.

Action 1: Revise the Rebuilding Schedule for Red Grouper

Alternative 2. Revise the rebuilding schedule to equal the shortest possible time period to rebuild in the absence of fishing mortality (T_{min}). This would equal $\frac{65}{5}$ years with the rebuilding time period ending in 2023. $\frac{2018}{5}$ 2019 would be Year 1.

Alternative 3. Revise the rebuilding schedule to equal 8 years with the rebuilding time period ending in 2025 2026. 2018 2019 would be Year 1.

Preferred Alternative 4. Revise the rebuilding schedule to equal the maximum time period allowed to rebuild (T_{Max}) . This would equal 10 years with the rebuilding time period ending in $\frac{2027}{2028}$. $\frac{2018}{2019}$ would be Year 1.

MOTION #2: ACCEPT THE IPT'S SUGGESTED EDITS TO ACTION 2.

Action 2: Modify the seasonal prohibition on recreational harvest and possession of red grouper in the Exclusive Economic Zone off South Carolina and North Carolina

Alternative 1 (No Action). During January through April, no person may fish for, harvest, or possess in or from the South Atlantic exclusive economic zone any shallow-water grouper (gag, black grouper, scamp, red grouper, yellowfin grouper, yellowmouth grouper, red hind, rock hind, graysby, or coney).

Preferred Alternative 2. During January through April, no person may fish for, harvest, or possess in or from the South Atlantic exclusive economic zone any shallow-water grouper (gag, black grouper, scamp, red grouper, yellowfin grouper, yellowmouth grouper, red hind, rock hind, graysby, or coney). Revise the timing of these restrictions only for red grouper in the exclusive economic zone off North Carolina and South Carolina as follows:

Preferred Sub-alternative 2a. January – May (five months)

Sub-alternative 2b. February – May (four months)

Sub-alternative 2c. March – June (four months)

Sub-alternative 2d. January – June (six months)

MOTION #3: ACCEPT THE IPT'S SUGGESTED EDITS UNDER ACTION 3

Action 3: Modify the seasonal prohibition on commercial harvest, possession, sale, and purchase of red grouper in the Exclusive Economic Zone off South Carolina and North Carolina

Alternative 1 (No Action). During January through April, no person may fish for, harvest, or possess in or from the South Atlantic exclusive economic zone any shallow-water grouper (gag, black grouper, scamp, red grouper, yellowfin grouper, yellowmouth grouper, red hind, rock hind, graysby, or coney). Additionally, during January through April, no person may sell or purchase any shallow-water grouper harvested from or possessed in the South Atlantic exclusive economic zone.

Preferred Alternative 2. During January through April, no person may fish for, harvest, or possess in or from the South Atlantic exclusive economic zone any shallow-water grouper (gag, black grouper, scamp, red grouper, yellowfin grouper, yellowmouth grouper, red hind, rock hind, graysby, or coney). Additionally, during January through April, no person may sell or purchase any shallow-water grouper harvested from or possessed in the South Atlantic exclusive economic zone. Revise the timing of these restrictions only for red grouper in the exclusive economic zone off North Carolina and South Carolina as follows:

Preferred Sub-alternative 2a. January – May (five months) **Sub-alternative 2b.** February – May (four months) **Sub-alternative 2c.** March – June (four months) **Sub-alternative 2d.** January – June (six months)

Vision Blueprint Regulatory Amendment 26 (Recreational Management Measures) MOTION #4: APPROVE ITP'S SUGGESTED EDITS TO ACTION 1

Action 1. Establish a deep-water species aggregate

Preferred Alternative 2. Establish a Deep-water Species Aggregate: snowy grouper, misty grouper, yellowedge grouper, blueline tilefish, golden tilefish, and wreckfish. Other species would remain in their current aggregates.

Alternative 3. Establish a Deep-water Species Aggregate: snowy grouper, misty grouper, yellowedge grouper, blueline tilefish, golden tilefish, wreckfish, silk snapper, queen snapper, and blackfin snapper. Other species would remain in their current aggregates.

SUBSTITUTE MOTION #5: SELECT ALTERNATIVE 1 (NO ACTION) AS PREFERRED FOR ACTIONS 1, 2 AND 3.

Action 1. Establish a deep-water species aggregate

Alternative 1 (No Action). The following recreational Snapper Grouper aggregates are in place in the South Atlantic Region:

- Snapper Aggregate: lane snapper, yellowtail snapper, gray snapper, mutton snapper, cubera snapper, queen snapper, blackfin snapper, and silk snapper.
- Grouper and Tilefish Aggregate: gag, black grouper, red grouper, scamp, yellowfin grouper, yellowmouth grouper, red hind, rock hind, graysby, coney, sand tilefish, snowy grouper, misty grouper, yellowedge grouper, blueline tilefish, and golden tilefish.
- 20-Fish Aggregate: whitebone porgy, jolthead porgy, knobbed porgy, saucereye porgy, scup, gray triggerfish, bar jack, almaco jack, banded rudderfish, lesser amberjack, white grunt, margate, sailor's choice, and Atlantic spadefish.

Action 2. Specify the recreational season for the deep-water species aggregate

Alternative 1 (No Action). Recreational fishing for blueline tilefish and snowy grouper is allowed from May 1 through August 31, annually. Recreational fishing for wreckfish is allowed from July 1

through August 31, annually. Recreational fishing for other deep-water species (misty grouper, yellowedge grouper, and golden tilefish) is allowed year-round.

Action 3. Specify the aggregate bag limit for the deep-water species aggregate

Alternative 1 (No Action). The following bag limits are in place for the grouper and tilefish aggregate and for wreckfish in the South Atlantic Region:

- Grouper and Tilefish Aggregate Bag Limit: Three per person per day: gag1, black grouper¹, red grouper, scamp, yellowfin grouper, yellowmouth grouper, red hind, rock hind, graysby, coney, sand tilefish, snowy grouper², misty grouper, yellowedge grouper, blueline tilefish, and golden tilefish³.
 - ¹Maximum of one gag or black grouper (but not both) per person per day
 - ²Maximum of one snowy grouper per vessel per day
 - ³Maximum of one golden tilefish per person per day
- The recreational bag limit for wreckfish is one per vessel per day.

MOTION #6: CLARIFY THAT ACTION 2 WOULD RETAIN EXISTING RECREATIONAL SEASON FOR WRECKFISH (JULY AND AUGUST)

Action 2. Specify the recreational season for the deep-water species aggregate

Action 3. Specify the aggregate bag limit for the deep-water species aggregate

Sub-alternative 2d. Two fish per person per day with existing restrictions on golden tilefish, snowy grouper, and wreckfish.

- 11. Explain how permit leasing works. How many permits are currently being leased?
- 12. Clarify the need for a Unique Invitation Code for online permit renewal

 - b. Table of management and coordination alternatives available to the Council to address species change in distribution and movement north
 - c. Pros and cons on permits
 - d. Tables of ACL for managed species
- 2. Coordinate with MAFMC and NEFMC to re-schedule the joint session on species expanding north for the March 2019 SAFMC meeting.

DOLPHIN WAHOO

Amendment 10

DIRECTION TO STAFF TO INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS:

- Action 1. Revise the optimum yield (OY) definition for dolphin.
- Action 2. Modify the recreational annual catch target (ACT) for dolphin.
- Action 3. Establish a commercial annual catch target (ACT) for dolphin.
- Action 4. Allow adaptive management of sector annual catch limits (ACLs) for dolphin.
- Action 5. Revise the accountability measures for dolphin.
- Action 6. Revise the acceptable biological catch (ABC) control rule for dolphin and wahoo.
- Action 7. Allow properly permitted vessels with gear onboard that are not authorized for use in the dolphin wahoo fishery to possess dolphin or wahoo.
- Action 8. Remove the requirement of vessel operators or crew to hold an Operator Card in the Dolphin Wahoo Fishery.
- New Item: Allow bag limit sales of dolphin for dually permitted for-hire and commercial permit holders.
- New Item: Modify gear, bait, and training requirements in the commercial longline fishery for dolphin and wahoo to align with HMS requirements (excluding monitoring).
- New Item: Reduce the recreational vessel limit to 40 fish for dolphin.
- New Item: Revise the ACLs of dolphin and wahoo to accommodate new MRIP data.
- New Item: Revise sector allocations for dolphin and wahoo.

The Council provided the following guidance:

• Remove Action 6 from Amendment 10 since this action is being pursued via Dolphin Wahoo Amendment 11, which is part of the generic ABC Control Rule Amendment.

Action 6. Revise the acceptable biological catch (ABC) control rule for dolphin and wahoo.

• For the potential reduction to the recreational vessel limit for dolphin, consider an additional range outside of 40 fish, focusing on vessel limits divisible by 6.

MOTION #1: ADD FOR-HIRE BAG LIMIT SALES OF DOLPHIN BY DUALLY PERMITTED VESSELS TO DOLPHIN WAHOO AMENDMENT 10.

- 2. PREPARE A WHITE PAPER FOR THE MARCH 2019 MEETING ON:
 - a) THE CONCEPT OF ADDING PREY SPECIES TO A FMP AS AN ECOSYSTEM COMPONENT AS WELL AS REGULATORY PERMAMETERS AND MECHANISMS FOR DOING SO.
 - b) HOW OTHER COUNCILS HAVE ADDRESSED UNMANGED PREY SPECIES THROUGH DESIGNATING THEM AS ECOSYSTEM COMPONENTS IN FISHERY MANAGEMENT PLANS AND POTENTIAL MANAGEMENT OPTIONS.
 - c) ADDITIONAL BACKGROUND INFORMATION ON FISHERIES FOR BULLET AND FRIGATE MACKEREL.
 - d) IDENTIFYING OTHER MAJOR PREY SPECIES FOR DOLPHIN AND WAHOO (FLYING FISH AND SQUID).
